COVID-19 Timeline

- January 3: First reports of a "new" coronavirus in China
- Jan. 28: US health officials expand screenings of international travelers and take other precautions, but insist the risk to Americans is low. The UofM cancels spring semester study abroad in China.
- Feb. 7: UofM cancels spring semester study abroad in Korea
- Feb. 25: LAC offers students in Italy the option to return home and begins developing curriculum via technology option
- Feb. 26: LAC establishes a "war room" model to start each day (now the situation room)

COVID-19 Timeline

- Feb. 28: US Dept. of State moves Italy to a "level 3," triggering evacuation of students studying in Italy
- Mar. 6: LAC begins work on online curriculum at all LAC sites
- Mar. 11: President Trump announces a "travel ban" from Europe
- Mar. 12: All UofM students in Europe are required to depart
- Mar. 13-14: Multiple countries close borders, requiring emergency 24 evacuations for programs in Spain, Argentina, Denmark, Morocco, Jordan, Senegal, and Kenya (in that order)
- Mar. 15: All UofM students abroad are required to return home

Assistance to Returning Students (& Those Who Never Left)

- Assistance with placement in on-campus course options (China and Korea)
- Waiver of student service fees with activation of services
- Established "Welcome back" message in collaboration with OUE
- Assistance with isolation housing for those who needed it
- Successful transition of coursework at all LAC's own program sites to online delivery
- Establishment of refund matrix, including assistance for ticket change fees up to \$500 and additional travel expenses up to \$500
- Secured tuition waivers for 3 or 6 credits for students needing additional courses for graduation requirements or to maintain full-time status for financial aid




The Cancellation Game

- All May and summer programs cancelled on March 17
- Fall programs cancelled on July 24
- Flexible financial policies and extended deadline for spring programs
- Working for spring ITRAAC "bundle" approval
- Students should be cautioned against affiliate or independent options
- Smaller list of LAC instructor-led programs for 2020-2021 academic year



The Future of Ed Abroad: The Bad News

- The costs
- Massive layoffs, particularly for providers
- Uncertainty for when and where travel will resume and US citizen mobility
- Crisis in higher education
- Exposed levels of lack of preparedness
- Will likely change models for partnership, programs, and funding
- Likely to have greatest impact with most already-underrepresented groups in the short term

- Exposed levels of lack of preparedness
- Will likely change models for partnership and programs

- Renewed focus on inequities in higher education
- Understanding of global interconnectedness
- Interest in underrepresented curricular such as public health and sciences







- 61 interns for summer 2020
- 223 enrolled for fall
- 11 sections
- 9 instructors in Buenos Aires, Dakar, Florence, Madrid, Montpellier, and Toledo
- 1 section taught in French
- 1 section taught in Spanish

Lindsay Sipple, a junior in the College of Design, intern at small jewelry designer in Florence, Italy

"I've wanted an international internship for a really long time," Lindsay said. "Even if I can't go to the country itself, I still want the experience with an international company."

"I wanted to step out of my comfort zone," Lindsay said.
"I knew that working internationally would benefit me with intercultural communication."

"This internship definitely helped me broaden my skills," Lindsay said. "My dream as of now is to become a retail buyer, but I could also end up in a completely different direction. Getting experience with social media gave me another path if I need it."

"Even if I don't end up working abroad, the soft skills that I've gotten from this can be applicable to basically any sort of communications or journalism or editing field that I go into," she said. "I've proven that I can work independently and write X amount of articles in a certain amount of time, and I can come up with those ideas and work with my supervisor who's in a different country."

Madeline Deninger, a senior studying strategic communication, intern with El Independiente, an online publication in Spain

"This internship wasn't something I ever thought I'd have a chance to do," Madeline said. "If COVID had never happened and it had been in person, I wouldn't have gotten the opportunity."
