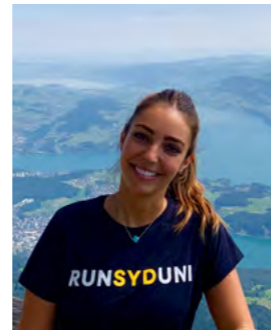

Semester *programs*

We have many options available for both undergraduate and postgraduate students wishing to study at Sydney. Students coming for semester 1 or 2 need to enrol in a full time load of 18-24 credit points.

Study Abroad

Every year, we welcome hundreds of students who participate in one of our study abroad programs. Some come for our academic reputation and wide range of courses, while others come to experience our vibrant student life bolstered by our guaranteed accommodation and unique Internship program. Students can come for 1 or 2 semesters and tuition fees apply.

Most units are worth 6 credit points and students must have permission from their home institution for 18 credit point study load.

Exchange

We have exchange programs with more than 200 partner universities in over 40 countries. If you're enrolled at one of our international partner universities, you may be eligible to apply for exchange. When you come as an exchange student, your tuition fees are paid to your home university while you study at Sydney.

If your home university has a partnership with us, you first need to apply to your home university's international exchange program.

You will need to be nominated by your home university before applying to the University of Sydney. Once your nomination is confirmed, we welcome you to follow the steps on how to apply.

Special *programs*

Short term

Each unit of study is taught in an intensive format while maintaining credit point values and academic integrity. Most unit of study options are taught alongside full-degree students and provide hands-on experiential learning in an Australian cultural context. Students can enrol in either 1 or 2 units of study

Spring friendly semester

This program aligns with the northern hemisphere Spring semester, allowing students to study a full semester worth of credit and return home in time for summer internships. Spring friendly students choose 1 unit of study from our Summer session (Jan or Feb) and 3 units from Semester 1.

Scholarships

The University of Sydney is proud to offer a number of scholarships to support study abroad and exchange students undertaking a program with us.

Social Media Ambassador Scholarship

This scholarship is for students from statistically underrepresented demographics in Study Abroad (first in family, First Nations, LGBTQIA+, women in STEM, student athletes) who have an influential social media presence. Students will be invited to apply for the \$1,500 AUD scholarship after receiving their offer to study with us, and if selected, will receive social media training and be given ambassadorial duties to promote their Study Abroad experience.

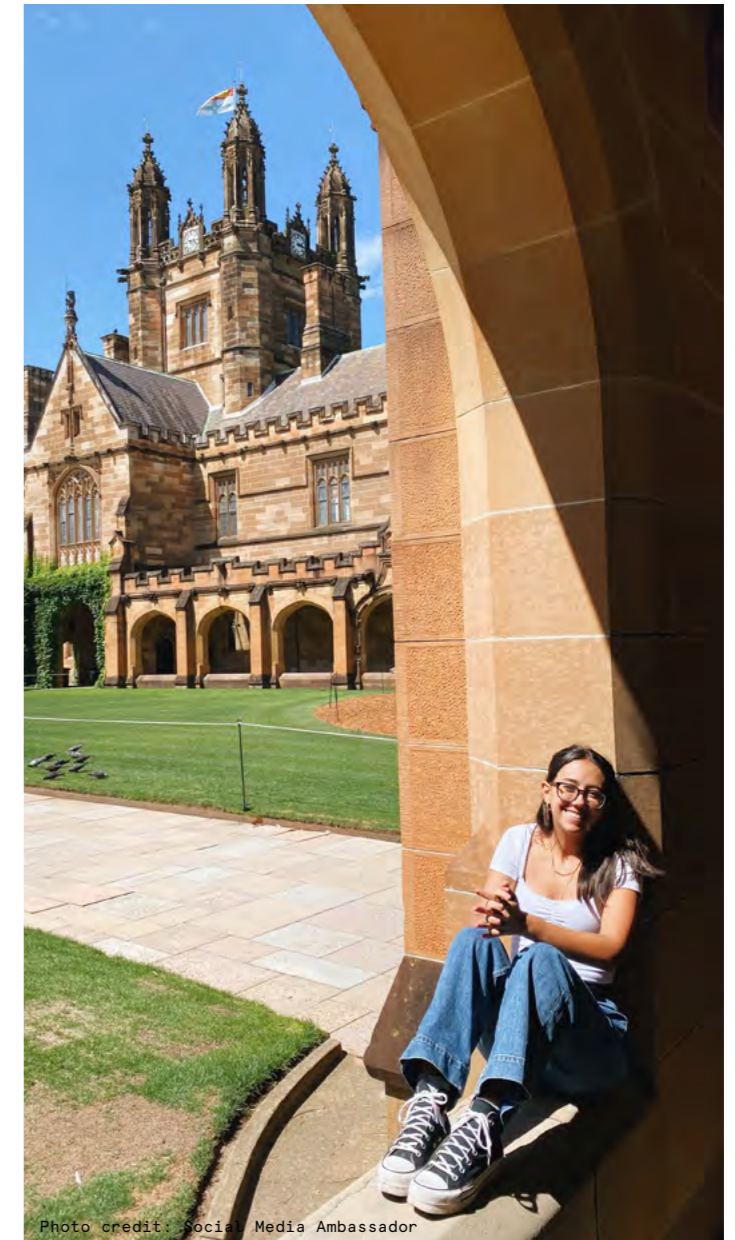
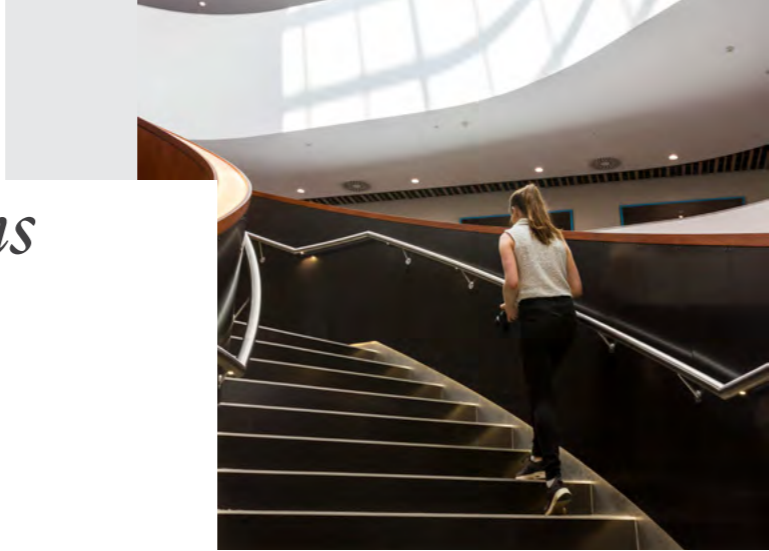

Internships *programs*

Combining your study abroad experience with an international internship can help you stand out in a competitive job market.



Complement your academic study with relevant industry or research experience via our internship program. Interns complete a minimum of 120 hours in an industry or research placement with one of our many partners or academics. The Internship unit of study is worth 6 credit points, and is taken alongside your other units of study.

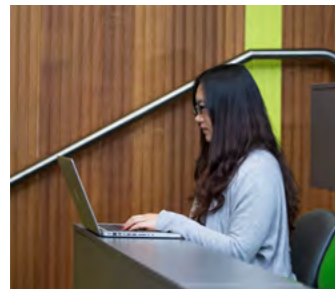
There are four intakes:

Summer	January–February (6 weeks)
Semester 1	February–June (13 weeks)
Short Term	June–July (7 weeks)
Semester 2	August–November (13 weeks)

Parallel to your work or research placement are four professional development workshops, academic reading and a range of assessments, including a final project report.

Placement is competitive and based on key performance indicators such as GPA, prior academic studies, as well as the interests of the applicant and host. Sydney Sustainability Program

Climate change is one of the biggest challenges facing the next generation, and something that current students will need to have strong literacy of as they enter the workplace of tomorrow.

The program can be taken either as extra-curricular or co-curricular, depending on which stream students choose. In addition, students undertake an additional 5 activities structured around the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), with completion resulting in a certificate and digital badge.

Two streams to choose from:

- **Stream 1:** take a credit-bearing unit of study from our list of [Sustainability & Environment unit list](#) as one of your classes with us
- **Stream 2:** undertake 20+ hours of sustainability volunteering at a local community garden

Both streams include:

- **Digital badge:** completing our SDG tasks will result in a certificate and certified digital badge, which can be displayed on LinkedIn.
- **Exclusive activities:** you will have access to a series of lectures and activities on sustainability, climate action & how to convey your climate literacy as you enter the work force
- **Program availability:** Semester or Short Term programs

How to *apply*

Step 1: Check if your home university has a partnership with the University of Sydney

If they do, you need to contact your home university. They will then contact us to nominate you.

Step 2: Search Study Abroad or Exchange, and find your course

Your course will differ depending upon your nomination, program (Study Abroad or Exchange), level of study (undergraduate or postgraduate), and duration (one or two semesters). For Short term programs, please use the Undergraduate Study Abroad Program (One Semester) course:

Step 3: Access your online application

Click Apply on the course page to start your application. You can save and return to it later.

Step 4: Submit your application

You should include:

- Your current transcript
- Evidence you have met our English entry requirements
- Evidence of Identity
- Your unit of study preferences

Step 5: Your offer letter

Your application will be assessed and if successful, you will receive your offer letter via email.

Step 6: Accept your offer, and if applicable, pay your tuition and OSHC

Log in to your Sydney Student and respond to your offer. If applicable, you need to pay your tuition, deposit and/or overseas student health cover (OSHC).

Step 7: Receive your Confirmation of Enrolment (CoE)

You need your CoE for your visa application.

Step 8: Confirm your visa and start planning your travel to Sydney!

Ensure you arrive before Orientation.



Eligibility *criteria*

Before you apply, please make sure that you understand our eligibility criteria.

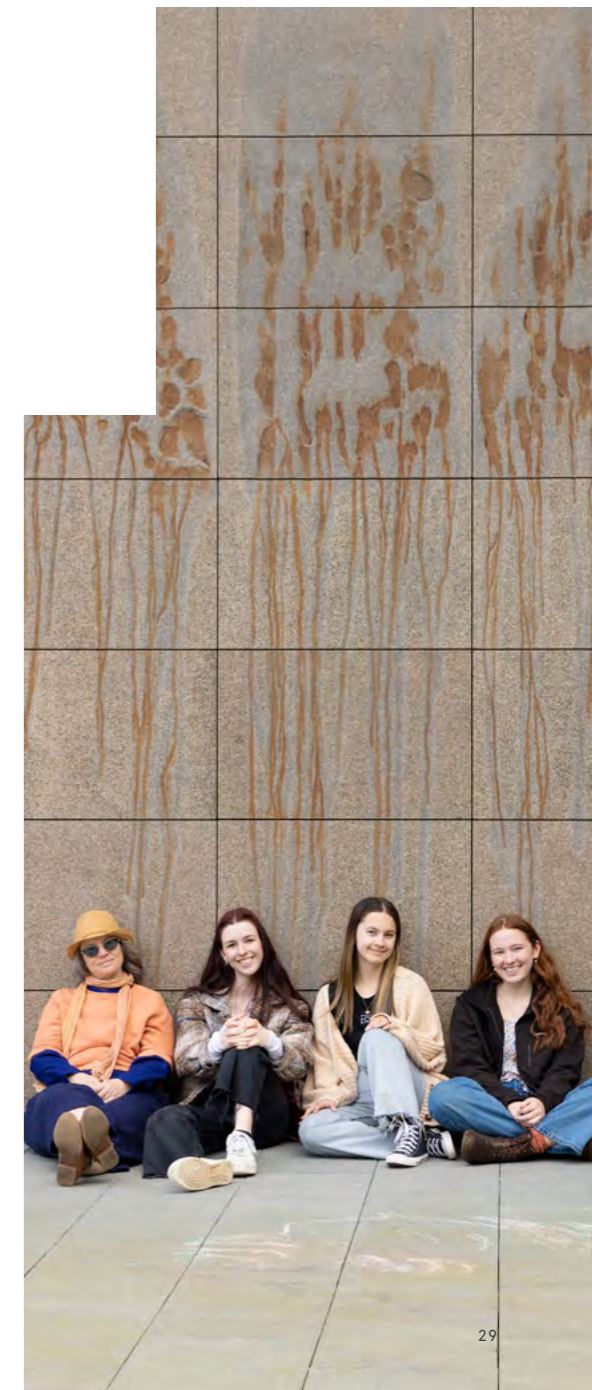
- Nomination from your home university if they are an exchange partner of the University of Sydney
- You need to have achieved a cumulative grade point average of 3.0 on a 4.0 point scale, or an average grade of 'C' or better on the European ECTS grading scale (or equivalent)
- Meet the English entry requirements as outlined on the website.

Overseas Student Health Cover (OSHC)

Health insurance is compulsory for most international students who are studying in Australia. It is a condition of your student visa that you maintain Overseas Student Health Cover (OSHC) for the duration of your studies in Australia. This cover needs to be arranged before you can apply for your student visa.

Guaranteed accommodation

Choosing where to live will be one of the biggest decisions you'll make after deciding to study in Australia. We provide peace of mind in finding a place to live by offering our students guaranteed accommodation in student accommodation buildings within a 15 minute walk to campus and located on the doorstep of downtown Sydney.

We have negotiated a special 20-week contract rate and length for Study Abroad and Exchange students at most of our preferred properties. Contracts start the week before Orientation and finish the week after the final exam period, meaning students don't pay for additional weeks they won't use. Your study abroad adviser will provide more information on how to apply for guaranteed accommodation once you accept your offer.



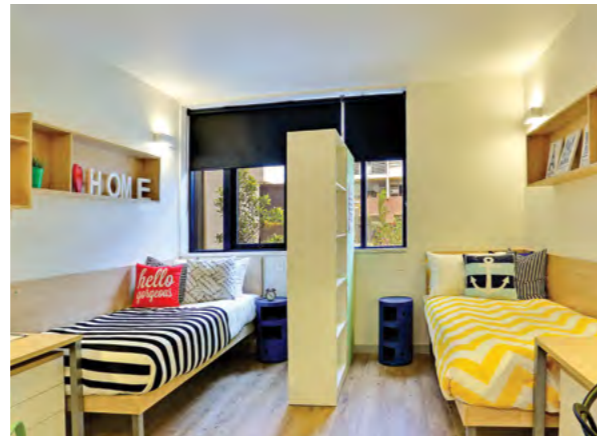
View of downtown Sydney, from the Queen Mary Building accommodation

Estimated costs

Living in Sydney: Costs

In addition to tuition and OSHC, you should include in your budget estimated living costs. We've provided a guideline to help you calculate your estimated weekly expenses:

Item	Weekly estimate (AUD)
Accommodation	\$345-725
Food and groceries	\$80-280
Public transport	\$15-55
Mobile phone	\$10-15
Entertainment	\$80-150
Weekly Total	\$530- \$1230
